Who experiences sexual violence?

Sexual violence affects everyone: All populations and all communities. No community is immune.

Communities and populations that experience systemic oppression often experience higher rates of sexual violence and more barriers to accessing resources. These groups include:

- Immigrants and refugees, including undocumented immigrants
- Black, Indigenous, and people of color
- LGBTQ+ people, especially transgender women of color
- Elderly people
- People with disabilities, especially intellectual and developmental disabilities
- Homeless people
- Incarcerated people

Furthermore, perpetrators with power and privilege often take advantage of vulnerabilities to inflict harm. For example:

- A professor might use their power over a student to coerce said student into a sexual relationship.
- A perpetrator might target an undocumented person because they believe that that person will be less likely to go to the police.
- A perpetrator might target a person with an intellectual disability because they think that that person will not be believed.
